

1. Guy Fawkes Night¹ (UK)

Guy Fawkes Night, often referred to as Bonfire Night, is an annual event that takes place on November 5th in the United Kingdom. The celebration honors the unsuccessful Gunpowder Plot of 1605 in which Guy Fawkes and his accomplices tried to blow up the Houses of Parliament, consisting of the House of Lords and the House of Commons. The occasion tradition sees families and users across the United Kingdom lighting bonfires and setting off fireworks, in addition to various community activities, such as burning figures of Guy Fawkes. The memorable phrase, "Remember, remember the fifth of November" is associated with the event. It is a key time for reflection and consideration of historical events, as well as a time for families and communities to celebrate together.



Persian Culture Highlight:

In the culture of Iran, the festival of "Chaharshanbe Suri," or "the eve of the last Wednesday before Nowruz," is a fire-jumping festival. Like Guy Fawkes Night, fire is a central theme of the festival, serving to purify and scare away evil spirits. Families come together to jump over communal bonfires, sing traditional songs, and usher in the arrival of spring.
